#### OUR MISSION

This year, we focused on three key areas:


- Delivering accessible, survivorcentred services across Sussex

- Demonstrating and advocating for intersectional feminist leadership.

These mission points guide us in creating meaningful impact, challenging injustice, and building a safer, more equitable future for all.

#### **OUR VISION**

Our vision is for us to unite to confront sexual violence, abuse and harassment so that no one has to face the impacts alone.

We listen to and believe survivors of sexual violence, and aim to provide both physical and emotional environments of safety and care.





#### OUR CORE VALUES

We are guided by our core values in everything we do, from our interactions with survivors to how we treat and respect our staff. These values are firmly embedded in our practices, providing a powerful framework for strategic and emotional decision-making at all levels.

#### 2023-2024 REFERRALS & DEMAND

Year after year, we have watched and responded to the growing demand for our services, reassuring us that more survivors are seeking support.

Increasing media coverage of sexual violence and abuse raises awareness in society. As a result, more people are seeking support from our services, accessing our training and resources.

The cost-of-living crisis, the long-term consequences of the pandemic, and over a decade of austerity—resulting in a reduction in the number and variety of available services—have contributed to a rise in both the number of people needing our assistance and the complexity of their needs. While the increasing demands and complexities present internal challenges, we remain committed to being responsive.

We received an total of 1,763 referrals, with 65% originating from professionals.

While 40% of our referrals come from residents of Brighton and Hove, our reach is expanding significantly into East and West Sussex, reflecting our growing presence and enhanced services in these regions.

Our referrals encompass clients of all ages, but we have identified a need to better serve individuals aged 50 and older, who have been under-represented in our client base.

To address this, we are proactively implementing targeted initiatives, such as a dedicated peer support group, to enhance accessibility for this important demographic.
















## YEAR ON YEAR WHAT'S THE PICTURE?

Data from previous years - comparisons and reflections.



Each year, Survivors' Network continues to meet the growing needs of the public by providing compassionate, survivor-centred services that adapt to the challenges survivors face. The increasing number of referrals we receive reflects a shift in societal attitudes, where cultures of silence around sexual violence are being challenged. Survivors are finding the courage to speak up and seek the support they deserve, and we are here to ensure they are believed, empowered, and never alone on their journey to healing.

# THERAPEUTIC SUPPORT

Although our therapy waiting list remains closed to new clients, our Adult Therapeutic team is diligently working to reduce waiting times and provide interim services for those awaiting counselling, including our self-compassion group. By the end of March 2024, we had reduced our waiting list to 496 clients, down from 1,000 at the closure of new referrals in December 2022.

We have implemented a quarterly mail-out for clients on the waiting list. In these updates, we provide information about current waiting times, share relevant resources, assess eligibility for other services available while they wait, and offer an opportunity for direct contact and feedback regarding our service.

New clients stared counselling.
